ordinances were developed long ago when preserving what we have was much less important. This grant provides us, the community, a chance to determine what we want to keep and what we want to change, and then develop our ordinances to enhance that," Hammonton Municipal Project Team Chairman Dr. Michael Hozik said.

Because of Hammonton's active MainStreet organization and the town's participation in smart-growth planning, Hammonton was the only town in New Jersey to receive funding from both the NJ Department of Community Affairs and the NJ Department of Transportation for this project.

"We have the opportunity to bring in a well-respected, innovative, planning firm, with expertise in development and redevelopment of places like Hammonton. Best of all, the entire cost of this project is being paid with external funding," Hozik said.

The project will run until March 2010, and has given Hammonton the opportunity to work with Brown and Keener, the nationally-recognized urban design and planning firm based in Philadelphia. Brown and Keener will collect and present background data, help Hammontonians develop a vision for their downtown's future, and develop guidelines to implement that vision. The planning board, zoning board, and mayor and council will be involved from the

Bellevue Avenue to Walmer Street.

"The project area was originally defined as the downtown MainStreet district. As the grant proposal was being put together, the area was expanded some. Subsequent discussions between Mark Keener and the Hammonton Municipal Project Team suggested the area as it is currently defined. As we consider what Brown and Keener have learned about the town in their initial studies, we may further

modify the planning area," Hozik said.

Hozik went on to discuss the project further. "Students of modern land use planning have observed that the kinds of ordinances that control land use development in most towns are not as effective at maintaining the character of neighborhoods as they might be. Forward-looking communities are exploring the use of form-based codes, which present development guidelines to preserve the charac-

ter of the portion of town in a particular zone. These guidelines are done with illustrations and list the kinds of results Planning and Zoning Boards are looking for. As an example, Hammonton has a single building-height limit for the entire town. Taller buildings might be acceptable in some parts of town, but we certainly wouldn't want them in our residential neighborhoods. Form-based codes graphically show various ways of complying with the goals of the neighborhood, while allow-

ing developers flexibility to up with innovative solutions. Form-based codes should be easier for developers to plan and develop projects that meet needs and satisfy the wishes of the community," Hozik said. sionals in municipal planning and urban design. They will start by reflecting back to us the important characteristics of Hammonton as it now exists. They will work with the community to develop a shared vision of our town, by conducting public sessions where they show people photographs or sketches of downtowns and ask questions like, "Which of these pictures most accurately reflects what you would like to see this portion of Hammonton be like in five years?" 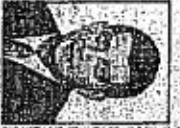

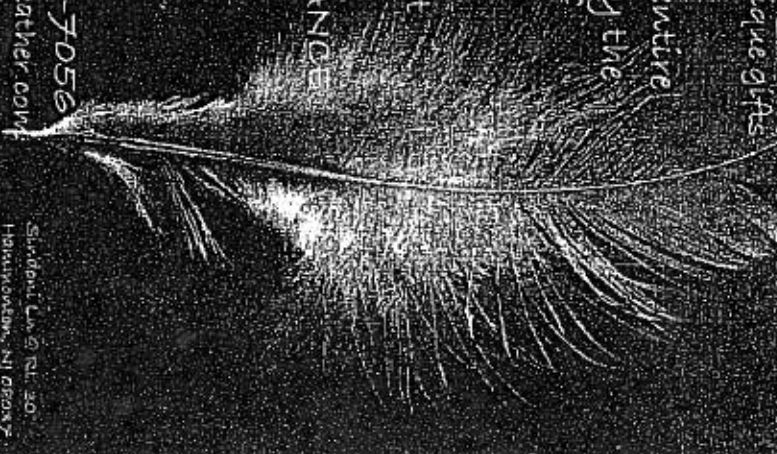

Corzine backs public-private partnerships for state colleges

MONTCLAIR—Calling it a big investment in the state's education of higher learning, Democratic Governor Jon S. Corzine visited the campus of Montclair State University on July 30 to highlight how the state's new recovery legislation will benefit college students and spur the economy.

"This is a new era in higher education in New Jersey — an era where the private sector is a full partner in our efforts to expand educational opportunities, open the bounds of human knowledge, and unleash the entrepreneurial spirit. Most importantly, everybody wins: New Jersey's college students, New Jersey businesses, and New Jersey workers," Corzine said.

Last week it was announced that Congressman Frank Lofredo had secured \$250,000 in federal funding for downtown revitalization. Officials from the town and The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey confirmed that plans were moving forward on creating a center or campus in Hammonton. Classes will begin this fall at St. Joseph High School in the downtown area, according to published reports.

On July 27, Governor Corzine signed additional economic recovery legislation that provides New Jersey with the tools to further reinvigorate the economy by providing grants for new development and gives state colleges and universities a new means to finance critical infrastructure projects.

Through the new legislation, colleges and universities can enter into public-private partnerships, allowing private developers to construct much-needed facilities including student housing, student centers, performing arts centers, even research facilities.

Montclair State University is an example of the urgent need and a demand for thousands more campus residential opportunities for New Jersey students. With its consistently growing enrollment, Montclair can only house 3,200 of the 18,000 students enrolled for the fall 2009 term. Under the new legislation, there is potential for development opportunities to address these needs.

"We want more of our bright, creative, energetic young people to stay in New Jersey for their college education, to attend one of New Jersey's great colleges or universities, and to contribute their skills and talents to the state's workforce. Our students deserve the kind of modern facilities that make a first-rate education possible. The Stimulus Act is a hugely important step toward making that possible," Montclair State University President Susan A. Cole said.

The Stockton-Hammonton project was discussed at the July 27 meeting of the Hammonton Town Council. Later in the meeting, Mayor John DiDonato fielded questions about the project from Hammonton Democratic Mayoral Candidate Joseph Ingemi. The following is a transcript of their remarks regarding the Stockton-Hammonton project, taken from a video recording of the meeting:



Governor Jon S. Corzine

Ingemi: "What do you think the total costs of ownership of the entire project will be? \$650,000? Is that the entire cost to do this renovation with Stockton?"

DiDonato: "The cost will probably be more than that, depending on how big they want to get this project, and I guess that goes back to Stockton. They're looking to make a significant investment in our community. So, now with the Congress and the Senate involved, this could blossom into something, and hopefully it will blossom into something huge."

Ingemi: "Hopefully, yes."

DiDonato: "It won't be a bad thing to be a university, or a college town."

Ingemi: "No, absolutely not Great. Thanks."

DiDonato: "Thank you."
